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WELCOME

TO THE ALLIANCE

In 2016, the focus of the Global Alliance of NGOs for Road Safety (the Alliance) was capacity building. A strong, knowledgeable, and effective road safety NGOs community is essential to achieving the United Nations (UN) Sustainable Development Goals target to halve the number of global deaths and injuries from road traffic accidents by 2020. The Alliance, as a connecting point for road safety NGOs around the world, is uniquely positioned to disseminate knowledge, coordinate action, and facilitate sharing.

We began 2016 by commissioning a learning needs assessment of our members to understand who they are and how the Alliance can best serve their needs. The findings showed that all road safety NGOs want to make a meaningful contribution to the road safety agenda, but not all of them operate at the same level and to their full potential. The insights gained have enabled us to design the Alliance Empowerment Program, a capacity-building plan that targets areas of weakness, offers training of varying intensity, and employs the expertise of larger, more experienced NGOs to guide newer, smaller ones. Already we are seeing results from our flagship initiative, the Alliance Advocates, and look forward to evaluating the long-term effects of the wider program. We are extremely grateful to all those Alliance members, partners, and sponsors who have contributed time and resources to train and mentor other members and enable the Alliance Empowerment Program to take off.

The Alliance Empowerment Program carries broad significance: building the capacity of road safety NGOs benefits not only the NGO and the Alliance but also the wider road safety environment around the world. Well-equipped road safety NGOs, advocating in their home countries and globally, make a safer world for all of us, every day.

OUR MEMBERS

Our members are a diverse range of organizations. Some are small and run by volunteers, others are large and work across several countries or regions. NGOs are founded in response to a need in their country. This need could be an urge to make school routes safer, address poor lighting at night, or seek justice for the loss of a loved one. Many have been founded by road victims or their families. The majority of members work in education, advocacy, and victim support. Fewer work in infrastructure and scientific research. Fifteen members work across all five of these areas.

LEARNING NEEDS ASSESSMENT

The Alliance's 2016 work has been shaped by our learning needs assessment. The learning needs assessment was commissioned to give us a firm evidence base on which we could shape the organization and its offerings to best serve the needs of our members. We assessed our members' strengths, challenges, and support needed to maximize their impact on the road safety agenda. The findings have given us greater insight into who our members are and how we can support and increase their capacity to reduce death and injury on the world's roads.

ALLIANCE EMPOWERMENT PROGRAM



Alliance Empowerment Program

The **Alliance Empowerment Program** is our primary capacity-building toolkit. It aims to improve the ability of NGOs working in road safety around the globe to design and implement initiatives that significantly reduce the risk of injury and fatality on the world's roads.

It offers in-house resources and collaboration with global road safety experts from among our more experienced members and partners, to build our members' skills. Members learn to undertake evidence-based activities that have been identified by the global road safety community as critical to achieving the Sustainable Development Goal target by 2020.

ALLIANCE EMPOWERMENT PROGRAM



Alliance Academy

The Alliance Academy is a state-of-the-art tailored training program, incorporating online and face-to-face elements. The program consists of two main elements:

- Alliance Advocates training is an intensive, in-person program that aims to create significant road safety shifts in delegates' home countries.
- Alliance webinars are a series of online courses available on YouTube that are primarily aimed at members but available to anyone with an interest in road safety.



Alliance Seed Program

The Alliance Seed Program provides funding for small-scale projects that have the potential to bring about measurable change and serve as examples of best practices within the road safety field. Its key considerations are a project's scalability and replicability. Seed grants' scalable impact is especially relevant in low- and middle-income countries, where they can prompt profound global change. Three grants were given in 2016, and their effects are under assessment.

Alliance Mentorship

Alliance Mentorship matches organizations that need support with experienced organizations in a range of areas, including advocacy and policy, communications and media outreach, program design and planning, and funding support.



ALLIANCE ADVOCATES

Alliance Advocates are self-starters who possess the experience, dedication, and willingness to create change. They will become role models for other Alliance members and change agents for their communities and governments in key risk areas. The Alliance Advocates are a vital investment not only for their own organizations but for the Alliance and global road safety stage.

The first Alliance Advocates went through intensive training in August 2016 in Memphis, Tennessee, United States. Before arriving, each advocate was asked to collect data and statistics on road safety within their country and to identify key risk factors. Throughout the training, the advocates built on their research to create an action plan that they could implement on their return to their home countries.

Much is expected of the Alliance Advocates, and we anticipate significant rewards ahead in our shared global agendas.

ALLIANCE WEBINARS

Online training is a key part of the Alliance Empowerment Program, enabling both Alliance members and the general public to increase their knowledge of key road safety issues, in a low-cost, high-value way. All the webinars are available via our website and on YouTube.

Let's Get Minimum Three-Star Roads By 2020

We created a series of six webinars with the 3-Star Coalition to give NGOs more knowledge about how they can contribute meaningfully to reduce fatalities on our roads. Infrastructure is an essential element of safe roads but is an area where few Alliance members work. The webinars cover how NGOs can apply the star-rating concept with the aim of ensuring that roads in developing countries meet a minimum three-star safety standard. Of all who used the series, those from countries with the highest fatalities were those with the highest number of views.

Crash Courses in Key Risk Areas

This collection of expert-led webinars covers key road safety risk areas, including: helmet use, drunk driving, speeding, seatbelts, child restraints, drowsy driving, and distraction. They bring together best practices shared by Alliance members. Those who successfully completed the end of course test in 2016 received a certificate.

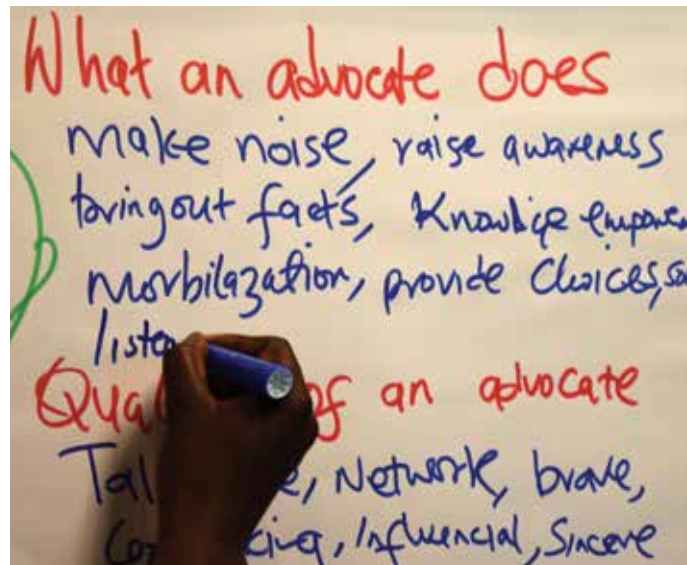

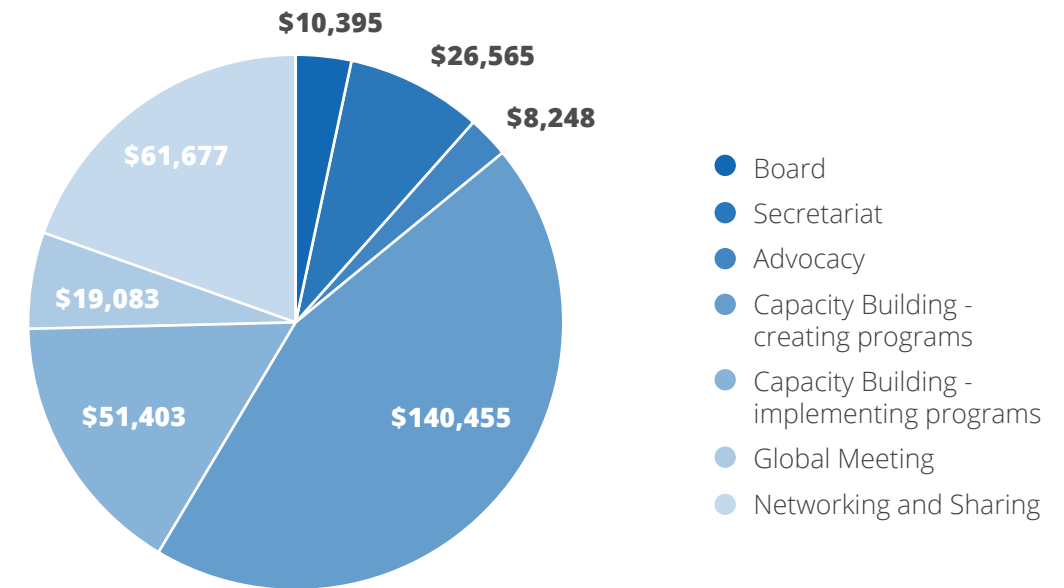
